Sexual Health: Bracknell Forest Overview and Scrutiny Committee

Funding and commissioning sexual health services

Responsibility for commissioning sexual health, reproductive health and HIV services is shared across local authorities, clinical commissioning groups and NHS England.



- Comprehensive sexual heath services including most contraceptive services and all prescribing costs, but excluding GP additionally-provided contraception
- STI testing and treatment, chlamydia screening and HIV testing
- Specialist services, including young people's sexual health, teenage pregnancy services, outreach, HIV prevention, sexual health promotion, services in school, colleges and pharmacies

Clinical commissioning groups

- Most abortion services
- Sterilisation
- Vasectomy
- Non-sexual-health elements of psychosexual health services
- · Gynaecology including any use of contraception for noncontraceptive purposes

NHS England

- Contraception provided as an additional services under GP contract
- HIV treatment and care (including) drug costs for PEPSE)
- Promotion of opportunistic testing and treatment for STIs and patient-requested testing by GPs
- Sexual health elements of prison health services
- Sexual assault referral centres
- Cervical screening
- Specialist fetal medicine services

Current 'core' SRH services

SRH services available in Berkshire East (2022/23) have remained relatively consistent since the 2017 HNA and currently include:

- Berkshire Healthcare Foundation Trust: specialist, integrated SRH
- SH24: home STI test kits that can be ordered online.
- GPs (2023/24): Long Acting Reversible Contraception (8/11)
- Pharmacy (2022/23) x 1: Emergency Hormonal Contraception (EHC) 13-24 yr olds
- Safe Sex Berkshire website: SRH service signposting, health promotion and advice.
- Youth team by thrive!: working with 3 secondary schools to support SRH education.

Also within Frimley ICS, NHS commissioned services for SRH include:

- BPAS as provider of Termination of Pregnancy Services
- Frimley Healthcare Foundation Trust as provider of Maternity services and Gynaecology services








Numbers of Bracknell Forest residents accessing specialist SRH services by service provider

Specialist SRH services accessed by Bracknell Forest residents: location of clinics 2015-2021












STIs

Bracknell's positivity rates are significantly lower than the national rate, but in line with the comparator deprivation decile.

Bracknell's highest rates among 20-24 year olds and second highest among 25-35 year old males and 15-19 year old females.

Higher proportion STI diagnosis among people from black or black British, mixed and white backgrounds (Berkshire East). Those from black or black British backgrounds appear to have the highest rates overall.

In contrast, those from Asian or Asian British and other ethnic groups have a lower proportion than expected. STI testing rate (excluding chlamydia) per 100,000 population and corresponding positivity rates

From 2018 there was no provision to BFC residents in Frimley Park Hospital.

Two Hampshire sites accounted for 5.7% of activity in 2018, 5.1% in 2019; from 2020 the proportion of BFC residents not seen in the 4 main settings listed were seen across a number of services and geographies.









Contraception: LARC

Sexual Health Education, Skills and Growth Overview & Scrutiny Panel

Reason for review

- Attendance at specialist contraceptive services per 1,000 residents under 25 by gender, in Bracknell Forest, in 2021 placed Bracknell 9th out of 16 compared to its statistical neighbours.
- Resident's concern regarding sufficient provision, which was easily accessible, for Tier 1,2, and 3 services for Bracknell residents.
- The chlamydia detection rate per 100,000 females aged 15 to 24 years in Bracknell Forest was 1,280 in 2022, was poorer than the rate of 2,110 for England.
- The number of new sexually transmitted infections (STIs) diagnosed among residents of Bracknell Forest in 2022 was 535. The rate was 427 per 100,000 residents, lower than the rate of 694 per 100,000 in England, and similar to the average of 430 per 100,000 among its nearest neighbours. ('Summary profile of local authority sexual health: Bracknell Forest, 30 August 2023').

Objectives/scope

The review will look to:

- Understand the impact, if any, of the current provision of dedicated specialist sexual health services for residents.
- Understand how specialist contraceptive service providers, and their partner organisations, work together to promote and improve services and assess their impact.
- Identify reasons why residents, especially those aged under 25, have issues accessing urgent contraceptive appointments.
- Identify the reasons for the low detection rate of chlamydia and HIV in Bracknell compared to other local authorities.

The review Panel will do this by:

- Carrying out a desk top analysis of public health data, for example information from Public Health Hub Berkshire East, the Joint Needs Strategic Assessment and NHS Digital data available online.
- Visiting services which serve Bracknell Forest residents.
- Interviewing service commissioners and operational delivery managers.
- Interviewing comparator local authorities with better detection rates.
- Talking to residents to capture their views.
- Working with the Bracknell Forest Youth Champions.
- Reviewing PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic) teaching in the boroughs' schools.
- Review complaints to Bracknell Forest Council related to sexual health service provision.

At the conclusion of this work the Panel will produce a report highlighting its findings and propose recommendations to the Executive about how sexual health services could improve and highlight good practice.
