35. Welcome

The Chairman welcomed all to the meeting and invited Kathy Hadfield to open the meeting with a prayer.

36. Minutes of the Previous Meeting

The minutes of the meeting held on 8 November 2012 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

37. Matters Arising

Further to Minute 28, Locally Agreed Syllabus and Related Training, Martin Surrell reported that training dates had been circulated and that he would be requesting Governor Services to consider providing training on the new Locally Agreed Syllabus in the next academic year.

Further to Minute 30, School Examination Results 2011 Review, Martin Surrell reported that he would circulate the validated results. He also reported that the

Government had withdrawn its proposals for the new English Baccalaureate Certificates to replace GCSE in some subjects and was now consulting on school accountability. Two key measures were proposed: the proportion achieving GCSE Grade C and above in English and Maths and the average points score in 8 subjects (English, Maths plus three subjects from the original list of baccalaureate subjects and 3 other subjects, one of which could be RE). It was agreed that the Chair write to the Chairs of Governors of Bracknell Secondary schools reminding them of the requirement to teach an accredited course as part of the Agreed Syllabus at Key Stage 4. (See also item 40)

Further to Minute 31, SACRE Annual Report, Jo Fageant reported that she would be posting the Annual Report, as amended, on the NASACRE website.

Further to Minute 32, Practitioner Workshop – Religion and Belief, Discrimination and Equality, Madeline Diver reported that she had been informed that the outcomes of the workshop would not be published until June.

38. Membership Update and Census Information

a) Membership Update

The Clerk reported that the Reverend Ken Blanton had been appointed as a Free Churches representative.

b) Census Information

Abby Thomas, Head of Community Engagement and Equalities, Bracknell Forest Council, tabled a report detailing the results of the 2011 Census regarding religion in Bracknell Forest.

She reported that those affiliated with the Christian religion remained the largest group at 61% compared with 72% in 2001. This was the only group to have experienced a major decrease in numbers since the last census.

The second largest group in 2011 was no religion/religion not stated which increased from 25% in 2011 to 35% in 2011. All other religious groups in Bracknell Forest rose from a combined figure of 2.60% in 2001 to 4.46% in 2011.

The meeting noted the report and thanked Abby Thomas for her presentation.

c) Humanism

Martin Surrell reported on recent correspondence with a member of the public regarding humanist representation of Bracknell Forest SACRE. He had informed the correspondent that the matter had been considered in November 2011 and referred him to the minutes of that meeting on the Council website. However he did agree to raise the issue again.

A discussion took place during which some members expressed the view that, as SACRE was concerned with religious education and humanism was not a religion it should not be represented. There were also concerns expressed that the co-option of a humanist representative might set a precedent, encouraging applications from a variety of beliefs and practices. However other members noted that, according to the 2011 census, the second largest group in Bracknell Forest was no religion/religion not stated. It was also noted that a number of other SACREs had a humanist representative.

It was agreed to invite a representative of the Berkshire Humanists Association to the next meeting in order to outline what the Association felt it could contribute to the SACRE.

39. Correspondence with the Department for Education

The correspondence with the Department for Education regarding the potential impact on RE on the Government's proposal for the English Baccalaureate (now withdrawn) had been circulated and was noted.

40. Ideas on an RE Event for Pupils

The meeting discussed ideas for an RE event for pupils to be held in the next academic year. It was agreed that a proposal be submitted to the next meeting. (Action Jo Fageant)

It was also agreed to purchase 6 copies of the recently produced dvd by Wokingham SACRE for KS3 pupils and they be sent to Bracknell Forest secondary schools with a covering letter from the Chair requesting pupil feedback.

41. Locally Agreed Syllabus and Related Training

Jo Fageant reported that a Joint Conference for Berkshire SACREs would be held on 5 June to coincide with the publication of an Ofsted report on the teaching of RE.

42. Work Programme

Further to Minute 33 a) of the meeting held on 8 November 2012 the meeting discussed its future work programme and suggested the following for inclusion:

- Establishment of a Working Party to co-ordinate an RE event for pupils (Minute40 refers).
- Leadership of primary school RE Co-ordinators.
- Monitoring standards in RE.
- Development of a toolkit for collective worship.

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NASACRE AGM Report

The first speaker was Alan Brine who is a HMI with special responsibility for RE. He reported the position as he sees it.

The Department is about to publish its third report on the teaching of RE which is concerned with the realising of potential. 60% of the provision is less than good and there is a need to address the concerns about the quality and the provision. Recent policies have placed an additional strain and caused serious concerns. On the face of it 60% of pupils gained at least a short course GCSE but there is too much of an emphasis on the rote learning of facts about religions and less on the learning from religions.

SACREs are under strain and there is great variation in capacity. There are questions about funding and access. On the positive side there are some very good new syllabuses. There is a problem over the position of academies and morale and purpose issues with no clear understanding of where they are headed.

The period from 1990 to 2010 was good for RE with positive national initiatives. There was leverage to identify schools in various categories and the numbers entering for GCSE long and short courses were booming. There were bursaries for trainee teachers of RE, strong recruitment and RE had purchase and a sense of purpose. However there were cracks was RE only there because of statute or was there strong educational reasons for its existence? There were legal oddities - RE had to taught in sixth forms but not in further education colleges. The GCSE short courses lacked rigour. SACREs were often fragile as was the National support. The teaching of RE was not improving in schools and its purpose was unresolved.

After 2010 the climate changed there was a collapse of support nationally. Las and hence SACREs were undermined. The coming into existence of Academies and Free Schools who did not have to follow agreed syllabuses caused problems. The GCSE landscape was changed.

There was some good news there was more innovative thinking. In some cases Academies were working well with their area SACREs. There were several new models for RE being trialled. The threats had generated debate.

There are several bodies moving forward the debate, Faith ambassadors from Secondary to Primary, Leading teachers of RE. Does RE try to align with the National Curriculum, REC to provide a national syllabus? Are these five years just fallow years? Do we need a concerted campaign to raise the profile and to stress the importance of RE? Are the structures in place adequate? Are they a strength or a barrier? All these questions may need considering but it is difficult to move forward whilst the Government refuses to engage in meaningful discussions.

This was followed by a report By Dr Mark Chater. He wished to challenge SACREs. SACREs existed to help teachers and teachers to help children. What help does the present structure provide? (There was a need to get more teachers into the SACREs) The challenges are many. SACREs are unique the system no other subject has such panels.

There are 154 SACREs and their position is ambiguous, some have little or no money to aid the improvement of RE teaching and its monitoring. Power has been devolved and SACREs defend the local determination of the development of RE. SACREs are semi-detached and isolated from the rest of the curriculum. The system is antiquated. SACREs can seek compliance with their ideas but have no means of enforcement. The Academy programme and the culture of school autonomy have created problems. The present structure of local determination creates additional problems and the aim to improve quality becomes irrelevant. It is an extravagance to have 154 syllabuses.

Municipal pride may stand in the way of National Quality. Perhaps we should investigate the concept of a National Curriculum.

SACREs would need to lose some of their freedoms.

RE could be more innovative and the findings of research would be more likely to be put into practice. The advisory bodies should be open to all faiths. They would engage with others. Standards would rise by engaging with the real world and by making the subject more rigorous. Are we ready for change?

The Berkshire Joint SACRE Conference: 6 June2013

The annual Berkshire Joint SACRE Conference was held at Easthamstead Park Conference Centre on 6th June 2013. This year's conference was entitled "Realising the Potential". The keynote presentation was given by Alan Brine, the National Lead for RE and an Ofsted inspector. All Berkshire SCARE's were represented but Jo Fageant was disappointed in the low numbers attending.

The theme of the conference was, "Steps forward – where do we go from here?" Alan Brine said that he could have called the conference "At the cross roads" because RE was experiencing lots of challenges with present government policy. It is not the only subject that is affected by this.

The joint revised Berkshire syllabus is good.

The three year report on RE will be published in the autumn and it will show that at its best, RE is enriching and academically challenging exploring how we relate to one another.

However,

§ Too much RE is not good enough with little improvement - 60% of provision less than good

- s Significant curriculum thinking needed to address concerns
- § Concerns about quality and provision at GCSE
- $\ensuremath{\mathbb{S}}$ Raft of recent education policies placing additional strain on RE although degree of damage still
 - unclear

§ Policy changes raise serious concerns about the capacity of existing structures to support RE

According the NASACRE surveys and Ofsted evidence indications are

- § Many SACREs under increasing pressure
- § Increasing variability in capacity
- **§** Issues with funding and access to expertise
- § Academisation raises serious and immediate questions about future of SACREs
- § Morale and purpose issues

There were 15+ fat years 1990s to 2010

- **SACREs functioning well**
- S National support strong DfE, QCDA, Model syllabuses
- § Statutory requirement retains leverage Ofsted
- § Broad consensus about RE NSNF
- § GCSE booming.
- § ITE bursaries, strong recruitment
- § Wider priorities giving RE purchase ECM, Co Co,

But the cracks were there

- § Statutory v educational justification not resolved
- § Convoluted legal 'oddness' not addressed
- § Short GCSE seeking 'relevance' not rigour
- § SACREs fragile and variable
- § National support similarly fragile
- \mathbb{S} On the ground little improving status too low
- § Issues around the purpose of RE unresolved

And then the climate changed

Collapse of national support structures

- LA/SACRE capacity undermined
- Academies and Free schools increase fragmentation of RE
- Culture around 'statutoriness' shifts Ofsted etc
- GCSE landscape shifts status crisis in secondary
- NC SofS imposing approach unfavourable to RE
- CoCo and ECM disappear as educational priorities narrow
- Religion shift in public attitude? militant atheism etc

There is some good news

- S Innovative thinking of some new syllabi -including our pan-Berkshire one
- S Some new models of partnership between academies and SACRES
- S Some academy chains exploring new models of RE
- S Threats have generated debate and interest APPG etc
- S New networks to support RE REQM, F2F, 3FF, Faith Ambassadors, Leading Teachers

We are where we are so do we

- S Try to align with the NC using REC to provide national framework?
- S Stay detached, build capacity and plan for better days ahead?
- S Develop a concerted campaign demanding Govt action?
- S Work behind the scenes at local level to nurture best practice?
- S Seek new models of structures/purpose/curriculum?

In groups, delegates discussed possible ways forward for SACREs. What can Bracknell SACRE do to encourage best practice and carry out its statutory duties?

Suggestions:

- Merging with another SACRE to pool resources and ideas. (Two Berkshire SACREs already work together)
- SACREs might get together to train sixth formers (years twelve and thirteen) to become Faith Ambassadors and they would then visit primary schools see Bolton website for more information.
- It was also agreed that SACREs should obtain copies of GCSE RE papers to acquaint themselves with the types of questions the pupils were being asked in the various short courses.
