

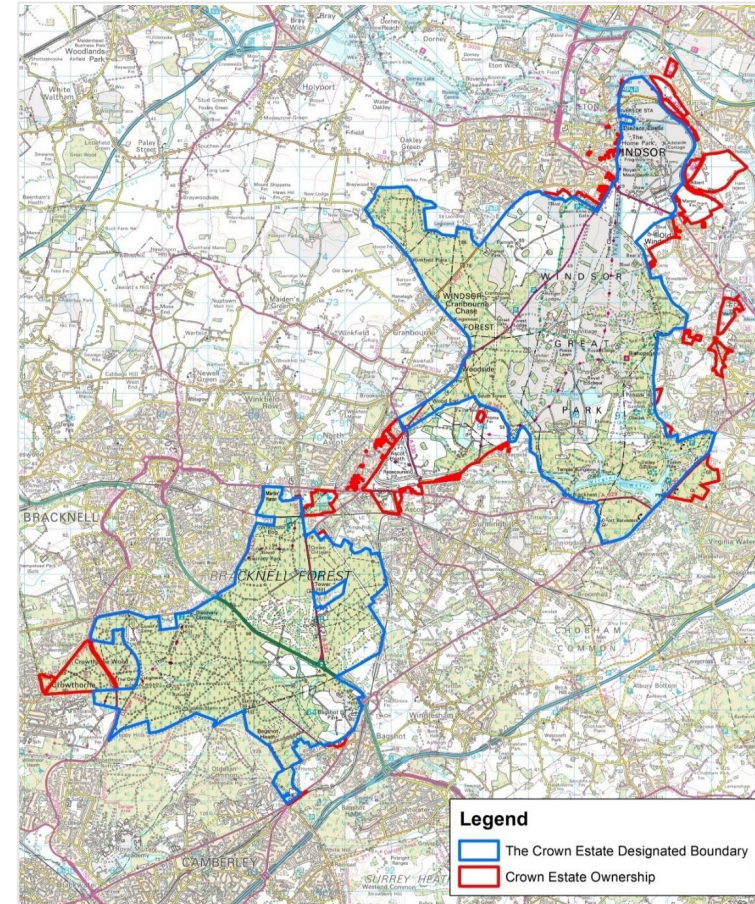
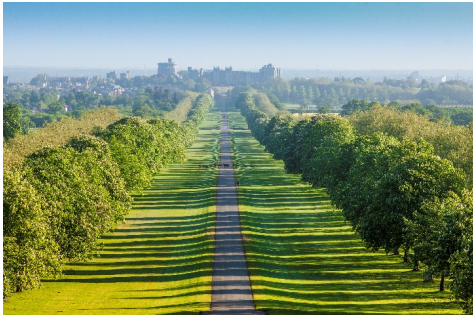

Windsor

- Crown Estate purpose “to create lasting and shared prosperity for the nation”.
- 6,600 hectares of Designated & Non Designated Land
- 80% of land is subject to environmental, ecological, and land use designations.
- TCE Act 1961, S. 5, sets out that Windsor is “*to be maintained in its present character as a Royal Park and Forest*”



Windsor Strategy

A **significant challenge** we face is balancing significant public access with the need to protect and conserve some of the UK and Europe's most unique environmental and ecological sites.
