UPDATE ON THE WORK OF BRACKNELL FOREST PARTNERSHIP DURING THE QUARTER

LAA refresh 2009

The work concluded with the signing of the reviewed LAA in June 2009. The work involved negotiating or amending 24 targets within the LAA where baselines or definitions were missing when the LAA was originally signed in June 2008, or where definitions had changed and the data needed to be presented differently. The 2008/09 refresh therefore contains more information, and is a more comprehensive document, than last year's LAA.

Community TV

Work has continued on developing more local film content to support the Bracknell Forest Community TV system, which is due to continue for another year. There are now ten 40" screens located in public places around the borough showing silent films and text, plus national news, sports and weather.

Bracknell Health Space

The development of a new health complex for Bracknell has moved a step closer with the appointment of a consortium made up of Ashleigh House and GSL to develop detailed plans for the Bracknell Health Space. The plans for the facility will bring together a wide range of services under one roof including GP services, urgent care, physiotherapy, out-patients appointments, cancer treatment, diagnostic services including blood tests and scans, and community services. It is expected that an application for planning permission will be submitted to the Borough Council by September 2009.

Voluntary Sector Compact

In May, the Voluntary and Community Sector Conference included the formal signing of the Bracknell Forest Partnership Compact. The Compact is an agreement between Bracknell Forest public sector organisations (Bracknell Forest Council, Berkshire East Primary Care Trust, Thames Valley Police, Royal Berkshire Fire & Rescue Service, and Bracknell Forest town and parish councils) and the Voluntary & Community Sector represented by Bracknell Forest Voluntary Action. In Bracknell Forest there are now many good examples of effective joint working between voluntary and community organisations and the statutory sector. The Compact will build on these good relationships by developing a formalised partnership.

Partnership Performance Overview Report

On 17th September the Bracknell Forest Partnership Board will receive its performance report to the end of the first quarter (as at the end of June 2009). Summary of performance overall (exception reporting)

Performance

In summary, out of the 198 indicators, 54 are part of the LAA including 35 designated targets, 3 local targets and 16 statutory indicators from the DCSF. Three of the LAA

indicators are actually broken down into sub-measures giving a total of 60 individual measures within the LAA.

Of the 60 individual measures in the LAA.

- o 17 (28%) are 'green' (or amber i.e. within 5% of target)
- o 3 (5%) are 'red' (> 5% adrift of target)
- o 26 (43%) are annual indicators or where information will be available later
- o 4 (7%) are where data is available but targets are not yet negotiated
- 3 (5%) have no technical definition yet for the indicator or the definition has only just been published.
- o 7 (12%) no data provided to date

The 3 'red' measures are:

- NI 117 16-18 year olds that are NEET the rate at the end of the quarter represents lower performance than in previous years and reflects the increasing difficulties that some young people are encountering in accessing suitable opportunities. Previous representations have been made to the Partnership concerning the progress for this indicator. It is clear that this is a problematic issue that extends beyond the direct control of members of the BFP, and is affecting young people nationally during the current recession.
- NI 136 People supported to live independently the Government recently changed the definition of this indicator which has meant that current outturn is below target. However there are several opportunities for us to improve our performance against target for this indicator during the remaining quarters of 2009-10.
- NI 020 Assault with injury crime The TVP have analysed the problems in reducing the assault with injury crime rate. It appears that approximately half of the victims are under 25 and generally the aggrieved are known to the offenders. Compared with other boroughs, Bracknell's night time economy is quieter and this is not impacting on our figures. Operation Lion Cub will hopefully address this problem

On a quarterly basis the BEPCT is reporting on a range of performance measures as part of its usual business across the Berkshire East are (reports available on their website). With performance against the LAA targets being highlighted in the performance reports to the BEPCT Board and monitored routinely at BEPCT internal performance meetings. However this data is not readily broken down into information for the individual three authority areas. Discussions are ongoing between BFC and BEPCT regarding how the data can best be obtained and reported in Bracknell Forest. A meeting between the BEPCT and the three unitary authorities has been arranged to resolve this potentially significant issue.

- o NI 068 % of referral to children's social care going on to initial assessment
- o NI 146 adults with learning disabilities in employment
- NI 142 % of vulnerable people who are supported to maintain independent living

- NI 154 net additional homes provided
- NI 155 number of affordable homes delivered

- NI 001 % of people who believe people from different backgrounds get on well together
- NI 193 percentage of municipal waste land filled
- NI 049a, b, c, d Number of primary fires and related fatalities and casualties
- o NI 047 people killed or seriously injured in road traffic accidents
- o NI 172 % of small businesses in an area showing employment growth
- o NI 177 local bus and light rail passenger journeys

Risks

In terms of operational risks, these have been scored using a system of 1-5 for likelihood and 1-5 for impact (5 being the greatest likelihood and greatest impact). By multiplying the two numbers an overall score out of 25 is calculated.

This quarter six operational risks have been identified with a score of 15 or more, as set out in the table below. Progress for quarter 1 against these high score risks are indicated *in italics* as below:
